## **Blacks Urged to Ramp Up Involvement in Internet Issues**

NASSAU. BAHAMAS Blacks need to become more involved in what might appear to be arcane debates over "net neutrality - having an open Internet – because the fast-evolving Internet will have a major impact on their lives, including how they consult with medical providers in the future, says Kim M. Keenan, president and CEO of the Multicultural Media & Telecom Council (MMTC).

"The next wave is going to be telemedicine," she said, referring to what the American Telemedicine Association defines as the use of medical information exchanged from one site to another via electronic communications - including smart phones, email, and video – to improve a patient's clinical health status. "The day is going to come when better care is going to come through telemedicine and if our grandparents don't have access to broadband – fast broadband – they are going to be left out." Keenan, who recently assumed her new position after serving as general counsel and secretary of the NAACP, made her comments here in an address to publishers attending the mid-winter conference of the National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA).

& Telecom Council, which recently changed its name from the Minority Media & Telecom Council, is a non-profit organization dedicated to promoting and preserving equal opportunity and civil rights in the mass media, telecommunications and broadband industries, and closing the digital

Keenan said African Americans should be concerned about the elderly, young students and everyone in between, all of whom are affected by a digital divide.

According to a study by John B. Horrigan, there is an economic divide that parallels the racial divide. It found that compared to more affluent students, 12.3 percent of all lowaccess to the highest speed tier or were overrepresented in the bottom tier. It also found that "13.8 percent of all African American students who, compared to whites, either lack access to the highest speed tier or are overrepresented in the lowest tier."

Keenan said that gap will likely expand under some programs, such has those launched by Google, that will target certain neighborhoods with service that will be 10 times faster than other offer-

Although there is universal agreement that the Internet should be open to all, there is sharp disagreement on how that should be implemented.

The Multicultural Media income students either lack consumer broadcast services

of the jurisdiction of Section 706 of the Telecommunications Act of 1996, but others -including President Obama believe it should be covered by Title II of the act, an older section that initially covered telephones and other utilities.

Obama said in his Nov. 10 statement, "The FCC is an independent agency, and ultimately this decision is theirs alone."

#### What in the World Happened to **Bobbi Kristina Brown? Police Say No Sign of Drugs or Alcohol**



ATLANTA -- Bobbi Kristina Brown, daughter of the late Whitney Houston and R&B singer Bobby Brown, was reportedly found unresponsive in a bathtub in her home in Georgia over the weekend.

According to TMZ, her husband and a friend found the 21-year old and immediately began performing CPR while they waited for the paramedics to arrive. Police, however, arrived first and immediately started performing "life-saving measures" until the ambulance came.

The Roswell Police Department says that investigators are on the scene at the hospital and the house, and so far there is no sign of a struggle or medications being found in the home. There is also no reported sign that drugs or alcohol were fac-

But one news source reports that police were called to Brown's house about a weeks ago, because there were reports of a fight. However, when the police arrived, no one was home.

Meanwhile, Brown is reportedly in a medically-induced coma but is still "alive and breathing" according to friends and family.

Her father, Bobby Brown, has released an official statement saying: "Privacy is requested in this matter. Please allow for my family to deal with this matter and give my daughter the love and support she needs at this time."

The bizarre incident occurs just about three years after Whitney Houston (her mother) was found dead in a bathtub of an apparent drug overdose. •

## **Local Meets Olympic Silver Medalist**

As a track coach, sports agent, and manager, he comes in contact with current and former top track athletes from all around the world. 

The Schomburg Center for Research in Black Culture located in Harlem, New York, is a research unit of The New York Public Library system. It is recognized as one of the leading institutions focusing exclusively on African-American, African Diaspora, and African experiences. Moderated by the Schomburg's Director, Khalil Muhammad, the forum featured Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist and author Isabel Wilkerson, Nation columnist and Columbia law professor Patricia J. Williams, Nation editorial board member and DeWitt Clinton Professor of History at Columbia University Eric Foner, Nation contributing writer and blogger Mychal Denzel Smith and award-winning author and essayist Darryl Pinckney.

This video is mandatory viewing for those that recognize the challenges Black communities face in their effort to achieve social and economic justice in America. During the forum, Rev. Dr. William J. Barber, II was recognized and applauded coining or helping to coin the phrase (The Third Reconstruction). The panelists opined that Dr. Barber's overview of The Third Reconstruction was their guiding view and definition. 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## **Income Inequality Rises In all 50 States**

WASHINGTON (NNPA) Income inequality is rising and it affects workers in every state, according to a new report by the Economic Policy Institute (EPI).

Researchers from EPI, a nonpartisan think tank focused on low- and middleincome workers, analyzed Internal Revenue Service data for all 50 states and found that not only was the income gap between the top 1 percent of earners and everyone else getting wider, but that the disparities were not just confined to financial centers in the east or technology centers on the west

All workers took a hit during the Great Recession, but top earners have recovered faster than low- and middleincome earners. According to the report, the top 1 percent of earners captured all of the income gains (100 percent) in 17 states following the Great Re-

In seven of those states where the top 1 percent captured 100 percent of the income growth since the Great Recession, the share of the population that is Black is higher than the national average. Those states include Delaware (22.1 percent), Florida (16.7 percent), South Carolina (27.9 percent), North Carolina (22 percent), Louisiana (32.4 percent), Virginia (19.7 percent) and New York (17.5 percent).

With the exception of Texas, where Blacks account for 12.4 percent of the population, the Black population is higher than the national average in states where the top 1 percent collected at least 80 percent of the income growth including Illinois, Arkansas, Michigan, New Jersey, and Maryland.

Mark Price, an economist at the Keystone Research Center in Harrisburg, Penn., said in a statement that state leaders and policymakers need to realize that inequality is a problem everywhere.

Researchers found the greatest disparities between the top 1 percent and the rest of workers in New York and Connecticut where the top 1 percent earned 48 times more than the bottom 99 percent.

Disparities exist in every

"Even in the 10 states with the smallest gaps between the top 1 percent and bottom 99 percent in 2012, the top 1 percent earned between 14 and 19 times the income of the bottom 99 percent," EPI reported.

Estelle Sommeiller, a socio-economist at the Institute for Research in Economic and Social Sciences in Greater Paris, France and co-author of the report, said that every state and every region in the United

States is going to have to grapple with the effects of rising inequality.

"Our study paints a picture of the top 1 percent in each state. While there are differences from the 1 percent nationally, no state has escaped the troubling growth of inequality."

The report comes on the heels of President Barack Obama's State of the Union address where he urged employers to invest in their workforce and to pay employees overtime that they earned.

"And to everyone in this Congress who still refuses to raise the minimum wage, I say this: If you truly believe you could work full-time and support a family on less than \$15,000 a year, try it," urged Obama. "If not, vote to give millions of the hardest-working people in America a raise."

port on wages by the Center for American Progress, a progressive, education and research think tank, said raising the minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour would increase the collective income of people of color by \$16.1 billion.

As income inequality rises, labor union leaders, policy makers and workers express heightened concern about stagnant wages.



"...If strong consumer protections are adopted and enforced, and a presumption against paid prioritization is adopted, Section 706 would be well suited to meet the goals of the Commission and communities of color. This authority will enable the Commission to adopt and enforce smart net neutrality rules that meet the goals of transparency and equity, while fostering broadband adoption and informed use. Section 706 has been successful in paving the way for today's open Internet, protecting consumers, promoting digital literacy and civic engagement, connecting schools and communities, and stimulating employment and entrepreneurship."

Because major Internet service providers, such as Comcast and AT&T, also favor coverage under Section 706, the civil rights coalition has come under blistering criticism. Lee Fang, writing in the online publication Republic Report said, "In other words, something close to half of the entire civil rights establishment just sold out the Inter-

MMTC issued a statement saying, "These recent posts are false, and we believe they subtly embrace coarse racial stereotypes." It continued, "MMTC and the national minority organizations formed their views on the Open Internet independently of the telecom companies, with no financial quid pro quos. Their position in the Open Internet rulemaking is the same as FCC Chairman Wheeler's position except that the minority organizations sought stronger consumer protections than the Chairman did – specifically, a fast-track complaint process modeled after Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act."

Keenan was still bristling at such criticism when she addressed NNPA publish-

position." Kennan said. "It's

so insulting that people think that as Black people, we can be bought or that we don't care about who will make it right for our community that we won't do what's right like normal people do."

Keenan praised Jesse Jackson's push to diversify Silicon Valley.

"Much has been said about Rev. Jackson, but if I were to look back over his lifetime and say, 'What is the most significant thing that he's done, I would point to this," she said. "A company [Intel] invests \$300 million and comes out and say, 'We're going to make our workforce look like America, we're going to make sure we have Black engineers, but not just engineers. 'They need to have Black lawyers, Black accountants.' People focus only on so many engineers, but there's a whole lot of these other peo-

She also lauded Black publishers, saying, "When you tell our story, it gets told in our voice." •

During a recent Raising Wages conference at the Kellogg Center at Gallaudet University in Washington, D.C., Richard Trumka, president of AFL-CIO, said that immigration and race are also work and wage issues.

"We must have a pathway to citizenship for all immigrants, and we must be a country of dignity for all people, regardless of race or ethnicity," said Trumka. "Justice at work and justice in our community are intertwined, and both must advance for either to grow."

Lakia Wilson, a guidance counselor in the public school system in Detroit, Mich., said that even though you hear on television that the economy is coming back, it hasn't come back for ev-

"I'm struggling, all of my counterparts in my profession are struggling and in other professions we're still struggling, so the economy is only coming back for some,"

said Wilson. Wilson, a Detroit native, with no children and degrees in elementary education and counseling, said that she considers herself part of "the working poor,"

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because sometimes she can't even afford gas money to get to work.

In 2004, Wilson purchased home and used a part-time job at the community college to help cover her bills. When she lost that job, she also lost her house. She rescued her house from foreclosure by cashing out her retirement account.

Now Wilson said that sometimes she secretly envies people with food stamps at the grocery store.

"I'm counting out every penny for groceries and I realize that I don't have enough to make it," said Wilson.

Wilson added that people of color need to know that the struggle is real and that all workers have to get involved from the pizza workers to the professionals.

"We all have to join together to raise the wages," said Wilson. "The money is there, we need to demand it."

The EPI report said that today's levels of inequality in the United States raise a "new American Dilemma."

It explained, "In the next decade, something must give. Either America must accept that the American Dream of widespread economic mobility is dead, or new policies must emerge that will begin to restore broadly shared prosperity." •



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

#### **Black History Month Programs** from the N.C. Department of **Cultural Resources**



RALEIGH, N.C. -- African American History in North Carolina is wide and deep. Examples of technological innovations, artistic excellence and uncommon courage can be found in programming at state historic sites and history museums. Other sites present aspects of African American history all year. The following listing highlights Black History Month programming and ongoing opportunities.

Feb. 7. N.C. Maritime Museum, Southport. Cruising the Line: African American Sailors.

Learn about the men who escaped enslavement and enlisted in the Union Navy patrolling off Southport's coast. Joining the North Atlantic Blockading Squadron, these mariners were instrumental in blockading goods vital to the Confederate war effort. As part of the permanent exhibit, a reproduction Union Navy uniform is on display. 9 a.m. Free.

Through Feb. 12. Fort Fisher State Historic Site, Kure Beach. Freedom Coming, Freedom for All. In observance of the 1863 signing of the Emancipation Proclamation and the 1865 passage of the 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, a traveling exhibit of informational panels outlining the struggle of enslaved people in North Carolina and the nation. In addition to the panels, the artifacts of U.S. Colored Troops Pvt. Luke Martin are displayed. The 1861 Springfield rifle and a captured Confederate officer's sword were loaned by his son, 97-yearold Luke P. Martin, Jr., recently deceased. Free.

Feb. 17. N.C. Maritime Museum, Southport. Rosenwald Schools. Donnie Joyner discusses the African - American struggles, triumphs, and their dedication to education in the Lower Cape Fear from the 1920s to the 1970s. Built in Southport, during school budget year 1921-22, County Training School #1 was the first public high school for African - Americans students in Brunswick County. Destroyed by fire before the building could be occupied in January 1922, the community raised funds and built another named County Training School #2. Program at the Southport Community Building. 7

Feb. 18. N.C. Maritime Museum, Beaufort. Pea Island Lifesavers.Pack a lunch for the Brown Bag Gam during your lunch hour and enjoy the movie "Rescue Men, The Story of the Pea Island Lifesavers." This documentary feature, inspired by the book "Fire on the Beach, Recovering the Lost Story of Richard Etheridge and the Pea Island Lifesavers", chronicles the true story of the only all African-American crew serving in the U.S. Life Saving Service, the predecessor to the U.S. Coast Guard. Film by Neal Hutcheson and Walt Wolfram. Noon. Free.

Feb. 19. Tryon Palace, New Bern. Songs and Stories: A Survey of Jazz Greats Mary Lou Williams and Dr. Billy Taylor, Jr. Jazz and blues historian Jacqueline B. Atkinson will provide you with a glimpse into the lives and artistic creations of Mary Lou Williams and Dr. Billy Taylor, Jr. In addition, jazz and blues vocalist Willie E. Atkinson, along with his transitional jazz trio, will perform jazz and blues tunes that made the artform such a popular genre throughout the world. 7 p.m. Free.

Throughout February. Historic Edenton, Edenton. Harriet Jacobs Walking Tour. Tuesdays through Saturdays only. Hear the amazing tale of Harriet Jacobs, a woman born into slavery in Edenton, who escaped to become a well-known abolitionist and author. As documented in her 1861 autobiography, "Incidents in the Life of a Slave Girl," this walking tour shares her story and takes you through downtown Edenton to see many of the sites mentioned in her book. Tours include entry into St. Paul's Church and the 1767 Chowan County Courthouse. 3

All Year. Somerset Place, Creswell. A representative state historic site that offers a comprehensive and realistic view of 19th-century life on a large North Carolina plantation. Originally, this unusual plantation included more than 100,000 densely wooded, mainly swampy acres. During its 80 years as an active plantation (1785-1865), hundreds of acres were converted into high yielding fields of rice, corn, oats, wheat, beans, peas, and flax; sophisticated sawmills turned out thousands of feet of lumber. By 1865, Somerset Place was one of the upper South's largest plantations. Free.

Feb. 14. N.C. Museum of History, Raleigh. Justice Theater Project: Voices That Challenge. Using dance, spoken word, and music, the Justice Theater Project presents Voices That Challenge, an original work about the voices and leadership of Operation Breadbasket. It features Baba Chuck Davis and is a collaboration with the JTP; Museum of History; Panoramic Dance Project at N.C. State University; N.C. Central University; Longleaf School of the Arts in Raleigh; and L. D. Burris. 7 p.m. Fee.

Feb. 14 and 28. N.C. Museum of History, Raleigh. African American History Tours. Explore the lives and accomplishments of African American North Carolinians from the colonial period to the civil rights era. 1:30 p.m. Free.

Feb. 21. State Capitol, Raleigh. With All Our Rights: Meet North Carolina's First African American Legislators. Step back in time to and "meet" a few members of North Carolina's 1868 first black caucus at the Capitol during this one of a kind living history program. Visitors will encounter actors portraying such notable figures as Abraham Galloway and James Henry Harris and hear about the lives and work of these pioneering legislators. •

## **Are You An Eagle Acting** Like A Chicken?

This summer, while attending my sorority conference in Dallas, our luncheon speaker shared this exhilarating message; it caused my table guests to ponder with thoughts of ourselves. We discussed whether or not we had been doing what we were sent to earth to do.

This is the story of the eagle that lived as a chicken for a lifetime, a fable by Vikram Karve. This condensed version written by me in my own way is the story. It goes like this...

One day a farmer decided to climb some nearby cliffs; during his climb, just before he reached the top, he saw an eagle's nest. Immediately, his instincts urged him to grab one of the eggs. He stored the egg safely in his bag, and noticed the sun going down, so he knew he'd better climb back down now.

When he reached his farm, he placed the egg in the nest of one of his hen's, and when it hatched, it looked different, but the mother hen and

other baby chicks treated the faint. eagle as if he too was a baby

The baby eagle learned all of the ways of chicken life, to cluck, cackle, it scratched in the dirt looking for worms for food, and it learned to flap its wings, flying only just a short distance as the other chicks did. Poor eagle knew he was a chicken, too.

Then the true test, the baby eagle looked up and saw an eagle flying, so beautiful, it asked "What's that?" The chickens answered "Isn't it lovely! Ah, such power and grace...magnificent! Isn't that a beautiful bird, it's an eagle. That's the King of the Birds. It's a bird of the air... not for the likes of us. We're only earth".

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




